About the lecture:

The Berlin-based Sethian Liberation Movement (SLM) is a self-consciously syncretic New Religious Movement combining Kemetic, Gnostic, and Tantric-inspired practices within the larger rubric of an antinomian, gynocentric 'Left Hand Path.' It began in 2002 as a splinter group from the Temple of Set, an occult order which itself broke from the Church of Satan almost 30 years earlier. Zeena Schreck (née LaVey) is the SLM's High Priestess—a title she held in both of its predecessor organizations as well. At the same time she and her long-term collaborator/ex-husband Nikolas also present themselves as Buddhist teachers within the Tibetan tradition. Drawing on their published works and interviews, this presentation explores the mediating role ideas from the Traditionalist School, particularly the fascist mystic Julius Evola's writings on Tantra, played in the Schrecks' reorientation towards Buddhism and interrogates the utility of the concept of 'conversion' for understanding this phenomenon, as well as the implications for 'Western Buddhism' and 'Western Esotericism' as categories of analysis.
